
# Where everyone is welcome

## In the Past

**Second Stage Readers Theatre** was started in 1985 as a forum for new and challenging works, allowing the focus to be on the literary value of the

script without the production and costs of sets and costumes. Though this program no longer exists, director Bernie Hauserman (1937-2009) initiated a **Readers Theatre Showcase** series through The Autumn Players, which is flourishing.

The Autumn Players began as the "Senior Wing" of the Second Stage Readers Theatre. They are a troupe of seasoned actors, directors, and writers dedicated to taking theatre into the community. Since 1992 they have entertained students, seniors, and in-betweeners with a growing repertoire of short and full-length plays, adapted classics, and poetry.

Over the years ACT has provided a variety of children, teen, and young adult theatre experiences. They all began when 11-year-old John Haber produced a play in his backyard. Popularity forced him into the North Asheville Community Center where, as Tanglewood Children's Theatre, he produced *The Ghost of Mr. Penny* in 1959. It was magical. Currently, Tanglewood is thriving at ACT: classes and camps are offered year-round, often generating long waiting lists.

# The Theatre Guild

**The Theatre Guild** was started as ACT Associates by Barbara Hodgson in 1990. By 1993 it became the ACT Guild which was absorbed into ACT's volunteer program in the early 2000s.
